

## DARBY & AMBER CAMPBELL MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

The Bonner County Human Rights Task Force supports the right of each individual to be treated with respect, opposes discrimination, teaches fairness, justice and equality and encourages everyone to live by these ideals. Each year the BCHRTF honors a high school senior who has demonstrated by their actions that they share these ideals and who can express their beliefs in an essay on a human rights topic that can be selected from a list of quotes on the application.

## SELECTION CRITERIA

1. Open to any high school senior graduating this year in Bonner County, including public, private, and home schools.
2. Each year the BCHRTF honors a high school senior who has demonstrated by their actions that they share these ideals and who can express their beliefs in an essay on a human rights topic that can be selected from a list of quotes on the application.
3. Indication of actions that support human rights, and ability to express in words ideals in harmony with the BCHRTF mission.
4. The selection committee also looks at needs in choosing a recipient.

## APPLICATION CHECKLIST

Print on normal printer paper (not thick fancy paper). Place application items in the exact order as below in a clear project folder.

- Official Transcript
- Recommendation #1 from a teacher or other school official (no family members or peers)
- Recommendation #2 from a community member or employer (no family members or peers)

### DARBY & AMBER CAMPBELL MEMORIAL ESSAY

Answer with a minimum of 1500 characters (approximately 250 words) to a maximum of 3000 characters (approximately 500 words).

#### SELECT ONE OF THE THEMES BELOW AND TYPE IN THE SPACE PROVIDED.

1. What person has most affected your thinking about human rights, and your resulting actions? In what ways has his/her philosophy impacted your own philosophy, and most importantly, your behavior?
2. What significant human rights issues do you think exist in your school? In your community? What can be done to address these human rights issues?
3. Let the word go forth from this time and place, to friend and foe alike, that the torch has been passed to a new generation of Americans- born in this century, tempered by war, disciplined by a hard and bitter peace, proud of our ancient heritage and unwilling to witness or permit the slow undoing of those human rights to which this nation has always been committed, and to those human rights to which this nation has always been committed, and to which we are committed today at home and around the world. -John F. Kennedy, *Inaugural Address, Jan. 20, 1961*
4. Peace, in the sense of the absence of war, is of little value to someone who is dying of hunger or cold. It will not remove the pain of torture inflicted on a prisoner of conscience. If I thought the war was going to bring freedom and equality to twenty two million of my people they wouldn't have to draft me, I'd join tomorrow. I have nothing to lose by standing up for my beliefs. So I'll go to jail for 400 years. - Muhammad Ali
